Massachusetts Student Loan Repayment Program

MA REPAY, the Massachusetts Student Loan Repayment Program, opens for applications today, Monday, December 5, 2022 and will close Monday, January 30, 2023. The program, which includes three separate loan repayment initiatives, is open to qualifying employees with a range of credentials, including but not limited to, psychiatrists, mental health counselors, primary care physicians, nurses, substance use recovery coaches and case managers who work in community settings, broadly defined as community health centers, community mental health centers, psychiatric units in acute care hospitals and inpatient psychiatric hospitals.

Applicants can go to MA-Repay.massleague.org to see if they qualify.

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Statewide Surveillance and Outbreak Testing Conclusion

All congregate care settings transitioned to Over-The-Counter (OTC) rapid antigen tests for surveillance and outbreak testing and can self-request OTC rapid tests through Color until December 29, 2022.

After December 31st, the Color program is ending and EOHHS will discontinue supplying regular testing supplies to provider-operated congregate care settings. To prepare for this transition,

- In mid-December, Color will automatically send a 3-month supply of OTC rapid tests to each enrolled provider-operated setting. Providers will receive a communication in the coming weeks from Color on how many tests they will receive and when to expect these deliveries.
- After December 31st, provider-operated organizations will be able to purchase OTC rapid tests, if needed, through the <u>statewide rapid test contract</u> at a discounted rate.
- A User Guide and instructions on how to order tests through the contract can be found here. Organizations are encouraged to bulk purchase rapid tests at a discounted rate for their locations. When ordering tests through the contract, please allow at least a few weeks of lead time before receiving tests.
