## **ABH Supports Black History Month**

February is Black History Month! The national theme for 2023 is Black Resistance, exploring how "African Americans have resisted historic and ongoing oppression, in all forms, especially the racial terrorism of lynching, racial pogroms, and police killings since our arrival upon these shores" (ASALH). ABH commemorates Black behavioral healthcare and human services professionals who demonstrate resistance by providing quality behavioral healthcare to historically excluded populations, and we celebrate how behavioral health treatment providers and the people we serve benefit from a diverse professional community. ABH continues to address racial inequities, advocate for culturally responsive care, and work to eliminate disparities in our behavioral health and substance use disorder treatment for underserved populations and communities.

## **Keeping Coverage**

As you may know, the federal government provided for continuous Medicaid coverage for individuals beginning in March 2020. This meant that many Medicaid enrollees kept coverage even if they did not respond to eligibility redetermination requests or



would be ineligible under standard program rules. The federal government is now ending the continuous coverage requirements and states must redetermine eligibility for all Medicaid members. This redetermination process will be the single largest health coverage transition event since the first open enrollment of the Affordable Care Act and the Medicaid expansion.

The state Medicaid program (MassHealth) will return to its standard annual eligibility redetermination processes beginning April I, 2023. Over the course of 12 months, all current MassHealth members will need to renew their health coverage to ensure they still qualify for their current benefit.

MassHealth is partnering with the Massachusetts Health Connector, Health Care For All, and other partners to make sure MassHealth members know how to renew coverage and to be aware of other coverage options if they are no longer eligible for MassHealth. ABH members can be important partners in educating MassHealth members about coverage renewal and the importance of keeping their contact information current with MassHealth. It is also important for providers to continue to check MassHealth's Eligibility Verification System (EVS) daily as is required by the All Provider Manual, because service delivery to ineligible individuals can result in nonpayment.

# **Removal of DATA Waiver (X-Waiver) Requirement**

Section 1262 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 (also known as Omnibus bill) includes provisions to increase access to medication-assisted treatment for Opioid Use Disorder. Effective immediately, SAMHSA will no longer be accepting NOIs (waiver applications) and all practitioners who have a current DEA registration that includes Schedule III authority, may now prescribe buprenorphine for Opioid Use Disorder in their practice if permitted by applicable state law.

Specifically, the new law:

- Removes the X-Waiver registration requirement. All health care providers with a standard DEA controlled medication registration will be able to prescribe buprenorphine for opioid use disorder without separate registration, subject to state requirements.
- Removes the patient limits. All health care providers with a standard DEA controlled medication registration will be able to prescribe buprenorphine for opioid use disorder to as many patients in their practice as needed, subject to state requirements.
- Removes the special DEA "X" prescribing number. Health care providers can use their standard DEA controlled substance registration number to prescribe buprenorphine for opioid use disorder.
- Removes counseling referral and ancillary services requirement. Health care providers with a standard DEA controlled medication registration can prescribe buprenorphine for opioid use disorder in the course of their normal medical practices, subject to state requirements.
- Removes X-Waiver training requirement. Health care providers with a standard DEA controlled medication registration can prescribe buprenorphine for opioid use disorder, subject to state requirements.
- While there is no longer a training requirement specific to obtaining an X-Waiver, the bill includes provisions that will require that all health care providers registered with the DEA take an 8-hour course on substance use disorder.
- SAMHSA and DEA are actively working on implementation of these training requirements, which become effective in June 2023 (Removal of DATA Waiver (XWaiver) Requirement | SAMHSA).

# **Free Youth Mental Health First Aid Training**

Youth Mental Health First Aid is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including AD/HD), and eating disorders.
