Massachusetts Eviction Division Initiative

Massachusetts recently announced a new Eviction Diversion Initiative to help households as the eviction moratorium in Massachusetts expires. Part of MassHealth's work is reaching out to networks across the Commonwealth to reach more residents with new and expanded resources, including rental assistance and legal resources.

They are asking the healthcare provider network to help in their effort to reach households early – before an eviction takes place – to provide funding and mediation tools to work with landlords.

MassHealth has launched a new website that connects residents to their local Housing Consumer Education Center, answer frequently asked questions, and more at www.mass.gov/CovidHousingHelp.

Residents can also call 2-1-1, which features a language line and trained staff. Time is of the essence – there is funding available NOW and the earlier households apply for aid, the quicker they will receive it.

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House Committee on Ways and Means Releases FY 21 Budget, Senate Expected to Follow

On November 5, 2020, the House Committee on Ways and Means (HWM) released its recommendations for the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget (H.5150). Totaling \$46 billion, this measures is an increase of approximately \$200 million increase over the Administration's spending proposal and 5.3% greater than the FY20 General Appropriations Act (GAA).

In developing H.5150, HWM relied on a revised projected tax revenue forecast of \$27.6 billion. a \$3.6 billion shortfall from initial projections. To pay for the proposal, HWM intends to access approximately \$1.55 billion from the Stabilization Fund (also known 'Rainy Day' fund), as well as rely on enhanced federal Medicaid reimbursement and federal coronavirus relief funding.

As the House of Representatives begins to debate the budget and consider the 777 amendments filed, the Senate Committee on Ways and Means is expected to release its budget proposal on November 12th and begin debate as soon as the week of November 17th.

EEC Update Regarding Governor's Executive Order

An <u>EEC Update</u> issued on November 3 notes that Governor's Executive Order effective on Friday, October 30 (<u>https://www.mass.gov/doc/covid-19-order-54/download</u>) requires that everyone over the age of 5 wear a face mask or cloth face covering when in public, both indoors and outdoors and regardless of the ability to maintain 6 feet of distance. This includes playgrounds, grocery stores, walking down the street, on public and shared transportation including carpooling and ride shares, at athletic events, at gyms, etc.

The update clarifies that EEC licensed programs are exempted from the Executive Order and should continue to abide by and adhere to the Minimum Requirements for Health and Safety regarding mask use for adults and children. (Please page 19 of <u>The</u> <u>Playbook</u> for the current Minimum Requirements regarding mask use in child care). Schools are similarly exempted.

Programs should encourage families and staff to abide by these new requirements outside of child care to help keep facilities and our communities safe.
